Recognition:

• On Sunday, June 11 CUF folks joined with other local open and affirming congregations for the 5th Interfaith Pride Service hosted this year by Church of the Good Shepherd, UCC. This service followed the Pride March and Festival on Saturday, June 10. CUF members and friends participated in the Pride March and then staffed a table at the Festival. Thanks to Alex Waller and all from CUF who joined in making this such a great event.

• On June 22, CUF hosted 28 young people with Bike & Build as they cycled across the U.S. to highlight the need for affordable housing. As was the case last year when the group visited CUF, in addition to a place to sleep for the night, we provided a potluck dinner and breakfast the next morning. • The Reproductive Justice Group has been awarded an \$18,000 grant from the UU Social Justice Funding Panel to help fund its work providing comfort bags and other support to clients and staff of Choices clinic in Carbondale. This will help the congregation further its work for Reproductive Justice as

• Throughout the year CUF conducts food drives to support food pantries and shelters in our area. In June we expanded our food drive outreach to include the Bethany Village Food Pantry which provides supplemental groceries to Union County individuals and families in need of assistance. Thanks to everyone who contributed to this food drive.

• As you'll recall, our primary air conditioning unit failed back in late May. We then had to rely on a secondary unit that is designed to support the main unit at certain times. Through the efforts of Jerry Molumby, the primary unit has now been replaced and all new "smart" thermostats, which are much more accurate and efficient, have been installed. Thanks to Jerry for his continued efforts to ensure that our building is well maintained.

CUF Receives Bright Spot Award

CUF's prairie/pollinator garden has received a "Bright Spot Award" from Keep Carbondale Beautiful (KCB). After our Sunday service on July 16, CUF folks gathered by the Cory Vine Memorial Bench next to the garden for a group photo as we accepted the award from KCB. Led by Charles Ruffner, CUF members and friends have worked hard to turn an acre of mowed grass into an environment filled with native plants supporting butterflies, bees, birds, and other wildlife.
