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The Practice of Deep Listening

Dear CUF folks,

Have you ever been listened to so deeply by another person that you feel it in your body? That you feel your muscles relax, your breath and heartbeat slow? I try to remember those experiences when I'm in conversation with someone else, even or especially when the conversation might be a difficult one. I try to remember to let go of tension in my body and pause for deep breaths, to open myself to listening without judgement, without interruption, without trying to help or fix the problem. That does not come naturally to me, I need frequent practice — what about you?

As the election nears, the divisions within our society, our communities, and even families seem to be widening. The voices of candidates, voters, journalists, influencers on all forms of mass media are ever louder and more discordant. The voices I hear from CUF folks, friends and family are ever more anxious and despairing — my inner voice has the same tendencies. What can we do, as Unitarian Universalists striving to live into our values of pluralism, justice, and equity? I've forgotten who gave me this advice, but it has helped guide me many times: when deciding between different actions, choose the most loving one. This makes sense in terms of our UU values, too: "Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values."
